## ANDERSON WOODS NATURE PRESERVE

Anderson Woods Nature Preserve is a 75 acre forested natural area in Fruitland Township. The property was donated to the Land Conservancy of West Michigan by Judith Anderson. Judy inherited the property after her parents passed away. As a legacy to her father who cherished the land, she donated it to the Land Conservancy in 2013 for the purpose of protecting it forever as a nature preserve. The property is located on Simonelli between Bard Road and Duck Lake Road.

During the spring and summer of 2015, the Land Conservancy will be installing a trail system to allow the public better access and enjoyment of this natural area. One of the trails will be built to optimize wheelchair and stroller accessibility. The Land Conservancy has worked closely with Disability Network/West Michigan to design an accessible trail so that more people have the opportunity to enjoy the tranquility and beauty of a forested natural area.

**WHITE RIVER LIGHT STATION EVENTS 2015**

The White River Light Station is set to open on Friday, May 22<sup>nd</sup> at 10:00 a.m. Hours are Tuesday-Sunday from 10:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., closed on Monday. Prices to tour the museum and climb the tower are \$5 for adults and \$2 for children 12 and under. There are four events scheduled for the summer:

***Saturday, June 6, 2015:*** Movie Night on the lawn at the White River Light Station. We will be showing “Finding Nemo” with a start time at dusk. Bring your lawn chairs and some snacks and come and enjoy the movie.

***Saturday, July 25, 2015:*** W.M.I. Dulcimer Friends will be playing at 2:00 p.m. at the White River Light Station. They are a group of acoustic musicians that between them have decades of experience playing folk music, the music of our ancestors handed down through time. This is the music played in grange halls for square dances. The musicians will be playing dulcimers, guitars and fiddles to mention a few. They play for the love of music. Bring the family, your blankets or lawn chairs and enjoy an afternoon of folk inspired music while visiting and exploring the White River Light Station. The museum and tower will also be open for the standard admission charge.

**Thursday, August 6, 2015:** “Ghosts of the American Road” at 7:00 p.m. “Ghosts of the American Road” is the latest brainchild from acclaimed songwriter Kevin Higgins and his talented musical partner, Barbara Malteze. Bring the family, your blankets or lawn chairs and enjoy an evening of music.

**Friday, August 21, 2015:** Yoga on the lawn provided by White River Yoga. Bring your yoga mats or large towels and water to drink and join SPLKA for yoga beginning at 9:30 a.m. In case a rain, we will have yoga on the lawn on August 28, 2015.

## **SMART 911**

Muskegon Central Dispatch 9-1-1 has added a new public safety service to help provide information quickly. Smart911, the national public safety service, allows citizens to create a private and secure Safety Profile online that includes any information about themselves or their household that they want 9-1-1 to have in an emergency. Muskegon County public safety officials encourage citizens to sign up for the free service that provides a way to plan ahead for an emergency. When that citizen makes a 9-1-1 call, their profile is immediately displayed to the 9-1-1 call-taker, resulting in an increasingly effective emergency response and saved lives.

Smart911 allows citizens to create a Safety Profile for their households that can include any information they want 9-1-1 response teams to have in the event of an emergency. When a citizen makes an emergency call, their Safety Profile is automatically displayed to the 9-1-1 call taker, allowing them to send the right response teams to the right location with the right information. Responders can be aware of many details they would not have known previously, and now fire crews can arrive at a house fire knowing how many people live in the home and the location of bedrooms; EMS can be advised of allergies or specific medical conditions; and police can have the photo or a missing child in seconds rather than minutes or hours.

“We see a great benefit to those callers who may have a medical condition or disability. If the citizen has created a Safety Profile, we can pass those details on to the response teams while they are en route so that they arrive on scene with better overall awareness,” said Muskegon Central Dispatch Director Shawn Grabinski. “Those valuable seconds or even minutes we can save by dispatching the appropriate response teams immediately can be lifesaving.”

Each household has the ability to customize their Safety Profile, adding the details they feel are important for 9-1-1 to know. In addition, Smart911 is a national service, and a profile travels with the user. If a citizen dials 9-1-1 in any location across the US that utilizes Smart911, their Safety Profile will be available to the 9-1-1 dispatcher.

All citizens are encouraged to sign up at [www.smart911.com](http://www.smart911.com) to be prepared for any emergency. Smart911 is free, private and secure, and the only time a Safety Profile can be seen is when the citizen places a 9-1-1 call. For more information, see below.

## What can I include in my Smart911 Safety Profile?



### People / Household

Include details and critical care information about each person who lives in your household.



### Phones

Add all landlines, cell phones and VOIP lines used by the members of your household.



### Addresses

Enter all addresses that you regularly frequent including home and work.



### Vehicles

Provide descriptions on any vehicles you may have.



### Emergency Contacts

Designate emergency contacts you want first responders to contact in the event of an emergency.



### Animals

Describe any pets, trained service animals or livestock you may have.
